


# 2023 Annual Report Weaving Threads of Impact





## Letter from the Board Chair & President and CEO Welcoming a year of change

Looking back at 2023, we deeply appreciate the trust and support of our fundholders, donors, partners, and volunteers. As the Board of Directors searched for a new leader, Ken Osterkamp served as The Alaska Community Foundation's interim leader. During this change, the Foundation's work to build philanthropy and help nonprofits across Alaska continued without pause.

A total of \$24.9 million in grants and scholarships was awarded, supporting over 1,400 nonprofit partners and over 150 students in communities from Unalakleet to Nikiski, Newtok to Tok, and Wrangell to Unalaska. The grants, ranging from \$100 to over \$1 million, helped families and villages recover and rebuild after the devastation from Typhoon Merbok in Western Alaska, made enriching summer camp experiences more accessible for Alaskan youth statewide, ensured critical housing projects were move-in ready before the end of the year, and so much more.

As a statewide community foundation, we must be deeply rooted in Alaska, which is unusually difficult in a geography as vast as Alaska's. Our Affiliate foundations in eleven communities across the state play a crucial role in meeting that challenge by growing local philanthropy while addressing their communities' unique needs and priorities.

Alaskans' spirit of caring and concern about the future is clear – the Foundation's assets reached \$210 million, and the total value of legacy commitments increased to \$163 million by year-end. Most of the planned legacy gifts have yet to be realized, but some were activated in 2023, like The Denali Scholarship Fund, described in this report, exemplifying the enduring impact of bequests. This growth in our assets and legacy commitments is a strong indicator of our financial stability and gives us the capacity to help Alaskans now and forever.

As we plan our next chapter, the Foundation remains steadfast in its mission to help strengthen Alaskan communities. We are focused on connecting donors to causes that matter and will work tirelessly to widen our sphere of influence and amplify the generosity of Alaskans.

Our deep love and optimism for this place is what unites us. Together, let's make more possible.

## Weaving Alaska's Future: The Impact of Legacy Giving

Education is a vital thread to unlocking one's potential. Legacy donor Frances B. Mlakar and The Denali Scholarship, established by her estate, serve as beacons of hope for students in Alaska, empowering them to weave their own vibrant tapestries in life.

Frances, or Fran, was a pivotal figure in Alaska, though she often flew under the radar. She and her husband, John, established Denali Fuel/HVAC in 1956 in Anchorage. Following John's tragic death in 1980, Fran demonstrated remarkable resilience by taking on the management of the successful company, a role she held until shortly before her death at 94 years old. Her leadership was characterized by a strong professionalism, a commitment to excellence, and a deep care for her employees.

Fran's philanthropic legacy for Alaska is significant. Fran played a crucial role in supporting ACF in its early years. With the encouragement of her accountant and confidante, Marion Porter, Fran made a generous donation to ACF in 2010 and put in place legacy plans for the Denali Scholarship Fund. The fund was recently activated by proceeds from her estate.

Like a thread woven into the fabric of Alaska's future, Fran's legacy is a testament to the impact of scholarship funds. In 2023, the Denali Scholarship awarded six \$20,000 scholarships, renewable for four years, to students seeking secondary education in Alaska. Scholarship funds are a crucial lifeline for many Alaskan students, weaving together the fabric of community and providing them with financial support.

As we celebrate the successes of Denali Scholarship recipients and honor the memory of Fran, we are reminded of the profound impact legacy gifts have on weaving a brighter future. These scholarships not only empower individual students but also strengthen the entire community. By investing in education, we invest in the potential of Alaska's youth, ensuring that the fabric of our communities remains strong, vibrant, and full of promise. Together, we can continue to weave a legacy of hope, opportunity, and enduring positive change for generations to come.

# 2023 Impact & Highlights

ACF awarded over \$24 million in grants to over 1,400 nonprofits, enhancing and supporting communities statewide.

Since its founding in 1995, ACF has awarded over \$232 million in grants, profoundly impacting Alaska communities and initiatives.

The BP Energy Center was a **valuable** resource for 330 nonprofits, educational organizations, and community groups.

More than **3,600 donors contributed almost \$29 million** to funds managed by ACF, demonstrating strong community support and commitment.

ACF awarded over \$750,000 in scholarships, empowering Alaskan students to chase their educational dreams and shape their futures. Donors established **182 new funds** to support and enhance philanthropy in Alaska.

Through Pick. Click. Give., managed by ACF, nearly **23,000 donors contributed over \$3.2 million** to nonprofits across the state.

Eleven Affiliates successfully met their fundraising goals, **raising over \$2.3 million in gifts and receiving an additional \$285,000 in matching funds** from ACF and the Rasmuson Foundation, amplifying their impact in local communities.

24 legacy commitments were made or updated in 2023, bringing the aggregate total current value of ACF legacy plans to \$163 million.



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
